



Justice Edwin Cameron Professor Sibusiso Nyembezi Max and Audrey Coleman

South African President Cyril Ramaphosa has awarded four Witsies his office's highest honour for their services to South Africa. Professor Sibusiso Nyembezi (BA Hons 1947; MA 1950; Hon Doc 1982) was awarded the Order of Ikhamanga, gold: Dr Raymond Louw (DLitt honoris causa 2015) the Order of Ikhamanga, gold: Justice Edwin Cameron (LLD honoris causa 2010) was awarded the Order of Baobab, gold and Max (BSc Eng 1949) and Audrey Coleman the Order of Luthuli, silver. The Colemans were the founders of the Detainees' Parents Support Committee, an organisation of parents formed to provide food, clothing and legal assistance to detainees under apartheid, as well as to monitor and publicise state repression. WITS ORIGINS CENTRE

The Rock Art Research Institute (RARI) is hosting an exhibition on the story behind the South African National Coat of Arms and the National Motto titled "Diverse People Unite" at the Wits Origins Centre. The exhibition explains the link between San Rock Art and the now extinct !Xam language. It is a collaborative effort between RARI and Canon and forms part of the Wits Centenary Programme. Thanks to a special arrangement with Iziko Museums in Cape Town, Canon South Africa arranged a large ultra-resolution facsimile to be made of the exceptional San Rock Art panel that contains the original painted image chosen for the national coat of arms.



WITS ART MUSEUM (WAM)





Jacob Dlamini (BA 2002, BA Hons 2003) was awarded the University of Johannesburg Prize for South African Writing in English for Safari Nation: A Social History of the Kruger National Park (Jacana, 2021). He also received the Writing in English for Safari Nation: A Social History of the Martin A Klein Prize in African History, awarded by the American Historical Society, which recognises the most distinguished work of scholarship on African history published in English during the previous calendar year. Jamil F Khan (MA 2018) was joint winner of the 2021 University of Johannesburg Debut Prize for his novel Khamr: The Making of a Waterslams (Jacana, 2020).
