Fixing Yeoville bit by bit

On 6 August 2002, a resident in the area alerted council to problems with Santa Monica, 56 Webb St, a sectional title building that had gradually been hijacked and was occupied with people accused of engaging in various illegal and criminal activities.

Timeline

13/5/03: council evicted everyone and bricked up the entrance

26/5/03: people broke into the building and stole everything - doors, pipes, flooring, electrical fittings etc

20/7/03: an illegal carpentry shop was set up in the driveway of the building, using electricity from across the road 4/9/05: the wall that council put up in 2003 to close the building was broken down and the brocks were taken away 13/9/05: the council said they would act to re-take control of the building

2/2/06: the carpenter was gone and there was a guard with a dog

17/10/06: an article on the Joburg website said Santa Monica would be fixed up as part of the better buildings programme 13/7/07: the guard and dog were gone and the carpenters were back

11/10/08: a fire broke out in the building, probably in the basement, but also damaging other floors

16/10/08: legal team dealing with bad buildings said Santa Monica wasn't on their list

3/11: the Inner City Property Scheme (ICPC) service providers were appointed and one of the buildings on their list is Santa Monica. The ICPC is still busy getting organised and has not begun working on any buildings.

10/11: Yeovue News was surprised to see scaffolding outside Santa Monica. ICPC said they were not working on it. Some people said the building had been hijacked again and the new hijackers were fixing it up. Then we found out that the sectional title flats had been bought, one by one, by someone called Nolitha Majola.

We managed to find Nolitha using Google. We discovered that she lives in Yeoville Bellevue, in Webb St.

Nolitha is originally from Tembisa. She sold a house there and came to Yeoville

Bellevue by accident. She was supposed to go to Ennerdale but it didn't work out.

She decided to invest in the area. She discovered that Santa Monica was still registered in the names of the sectional title owners, even though council had promised to take over the building years ago. She was able to buy the units in Santa Monica slowly using the proceeds of the sale of her Tembisa house. Then she got money from TUHF to fix the building.

Construction should be complete by mid-December and all flats have already been booked.

This is one way that Yeoville Bellevue can be improved - individuals buying properties and fixing them up or building new properties and providing hopefully well-managed accommodation.

There are other routes too - such as the

ICPC, social housing or cooperatives. The main thing is that the housing situation in Yeoville Bellevue must be addressed.

Key challenges are putting an end to hijacking and overcrowding, tenants paying their rents and services, land owners maintaining and managing their properties, proper relationships between tenants and landowners, provision of affordable housing (by state or private sector), and controlling land-use (no illegal spazas, liquor outlets, car repairs etc). If these challenges are addressed, Yeoville Bellevue can become a better place to live and a good place for homeowners to invest their money and live here.

Will Santa Monica show the way? The flats are not cheap, so it won't help the poor. But fixing the building will improve the area and that is a good thing.




