

What is the Disability Rights Unit?



The Disability Rights Unit (DRU) is a support Unit dedicated to assisting all students and staff with a disability at Wits University. Staffed by a team of nine, the Unit provides reasonable accommodation to the university community. This is inclusive of South African Sign Language (SASL) interpretation, real-time captioning, assistive technology and devices, PC labs on two campuses with dedicated accessibility software, mobility training, editing of learning material into accessible formats, screening and guidance on adaptations for specific learning disabilities.

The Unit is also available to those who wish to apply for extra time and accessible parking bays.



In 2021 Wits University had over 1100 students indicating having a disability. This is 2.8% of the student population.

1. Screen Readers



NON VISUAL DESKTOP ACCESS (NVDA): NVDA is a screen reader that allows blind and visually impaired people to access their computers by providing feedback via synthetic speech and Braille, and is free to download and use. 2. Text-to-Speech / Literacy / Writing Support Software



READ&WRITE: Read&Write is a text-to-speech, literacy and writing support software which integrates reading, writing, studying, and re- search support tools with

common applications. Enhances accessibility by offering features like reading out loud, built-in dictionaries, summary highlighters, and turning text to audio.All Witsies have access to a full license of this software. Download and install the trial version for your device and then log in with a Microsoft account using your Wits credentials, Username: Wits email address and Password: Wits ICT password. GOOGLE LIVE CAPTION / LIVE TRANSCRIBE: Google Live Caption and Live Transcribe are a new speech-to-text accessibility service built by Google for the deaf and hard of hearing, which performs real-time transcription of speech to text on your screen, so you can participate in conversations going on in the world around you. Live Caption can be enabled directly from Google Chrome and generates the captions/ subtitles when viewing media such as online lectures.

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OTTER.AI: Otter is an Al-powered assistant which generates captions, transcriptions and rich notes for meetings, interviews, lectures, and other important voice conversations. Also works well with Zoom and Microsoft Teams to generate live captions. Otter is free with limited fea- tures, a professional license is available for purchase (with a discount for staff and students from educational institutions).
